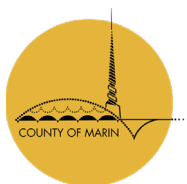

- Offers a \$50,000 cost-share drought-relief program. Working on an additional \$150,000 that could be available beginning July 1, 2021.

Two Spanish-speaking staff members can answer questions and help you apply to programs listed below. *Dial extension 100 or extension 115 to reach the Spanish-speaking staff members.*

Livestock Feed Program (LFP): for losses affecting non-irrigated pasture and forage for grazing only.

Emergency Livestock Assistance Program (ELAP): Water Hauling for Livestock

Noninsured Assistance (NAP): Insurance for cut hay or cut silage, must be purchased prior to disaster crop year. Producers must file a notice of loss to begin the process.

Emergency Conservation Program (ECP): Being requested for 2021. Covers wells, springs, tanks, troughs, and more.

Emergency loans are available for secretarial designated counties. For more info on emergency loans, contact the Ukiah FSA Office at (707) 468-9223.

RESOURCES: Provides technical assistance to farmers and ranchers.

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) provides funding for livestock water and water system expansion, getting water to underutilized forage areas. Applications are competitive and accepted in batching periods; the next one is in June 2021.

Also offers a waiver process under EQIP where staff provides technical assistance, designs and specs but the producer is responsible for project implementation without being guaranteed EQIP funding. Environmental and cultural review is required.
